Chapter Six begins with a passage written by the writer Henry David Thoreau and highlighted by Chris McCandless. Thoreau (1817-1862) was part of a literary and philosophical movement called Transcendentalism, which started in New England in the 19th century.

Some of the main ideas of Transcendentalism include the following:

- Self-reliance: The Transcendentalists distrusted anyone claiming political, religious, or intellectual authority. They believed that each person should trust his or her own intuition.
- Society vs. the individual: Society is usually misguided, and it tends to force conformity.
- The connection between people and nature: Nature and human beings are not separate; in fact, everything that exists is unified by one spirit.
